Who we are

What does this look like?

Cultivating an early childhood ecosystem requires whole community collaborative impact. Therefore, we collaborate with those who has an impact in young children's lives including those who care for children, support children, teach children and invest in children.

Together our work **strengthens** the connections between these groups, **fills the gaps** in resources and **increases the quality** of care, support and education for children and families.

- Sound policy to support young children and families to thrive
- Increase public awareness and will re: the critical years of early childhood
- Support **effective leadership** and advocacy
- Provide relevant professional development towards improved quality
- Provide direct services in partnership with other organizations to fill gaps



ECPAC Sustainability Strategies


- 1. Nurturing strong, strategic partnerships to help "champion" and provide leadership for efforts, build momentum and investment, and share responsibility for outcomes;
- 2. Continual assessment of outcomes and continuous quality improvement;
- 3. Communication and marketing to increase awareness and advocacy to increase investment;
- 4. Authentic family engagement in planning, implementation, and evaluation to further successful outcomes that meet the needs of the community;
- 5. Co-location of staff/partners as appropriate to increase community focus and shared responsibility; and
- 6. Hold expectations for sustainable "change in practice" through professional development, technical assistance, policy and procedural changes, shared accountability, and hard discussions as needed.



Prevent and/or Mitigate Impacts of

- Poverty
- Child abuse and neglect
- Mothers with three or more risk factors
- Poor academic outcomes

Facilitators for success



- Relationships matter
- Break work up into manageable workplans
- Monthly partner meetings to co-implement strategies and monitor progress/shift as needed = accountability
- Align work with other ECPAC and partner initiatives, plans, and missions
- Funding use LAUNCH and CMP as "seed" funding
- Evaluate, share successes and focus on what works
